

## EVENING TRANSCRIPT.

THURSDAY EVENING, MARCH 6.

**ANOTHER TURN OUT.** In consequence of notice given by the Agent, that the proprietors of the Dover (N. H.) Factories (the Cochecho Company) had resolved to stop their Mill No 2, on the 1st inst, and that a reduced tariff of wages would take place from that day, the female operatives, to the number of six or seven hundred, abandoned work, and issued a Manifesto to the "Honorable Agent," &c, as rough as a teazel, and concluding, after the admirable example of their noble sisters at Lowell, with a shower of Pierian rain, of which we have preserved the following drops:

Who among us can ever bear  
The shocking fate of slaves to share?  
Or who but will ward off the blow,  
And the cause of tyranny o'erthrow!  
We will assert our liberty,  
While we are of a nation free;  
Though you may say we're a feeble band!  
Yet your designs we understand.

They subsequently held a *Great Meeting* at the Court House, where at least a *mile* of them congregated, and passed a string of spirited resolutions, very becoming "the daughters of freemen." There is one of their resolves, which is so sarcastic and so true, that we incline to the opinion they were unconscious of its import. It is as follows:

Resolved, That we believe the "unusual pressure of the times," which is so much complained of, to have been caused by artful and designing men, to subserve party purposes, or more wickedly still, to promote their own ends. !!

What will the General say to this resolve of his "Three Miles of Girls?"

After the adoption of the resolutions, the principal one of which is, that they will not work at the reduced "tariff of wages," a communication from one of the members was read, exhorting them to persist in the endeavors to obtain the old prices for labor, and not to work for the new, and to correspond with those of their own sex similarly situated in other places, to encourage them to adopt a like course. The communication was well received, and the following votes were passed:

Voted, That a committee of twelve be chosen to communicate the proceedings of this meeting to the girls employed at the Factories at Great Falls, Newmarket, and Lowell.

Voted, That a fund be raised and appropriated to defray the expenses of those, in returning to their homes, who may not have the means at their command.

All this is mighty fine, and shows a commendable spirit in the girls, which we admire much, and should more, if it was rightly directed; but we will venture a trifling wager that, without persuasion or attempt at intimidation, but of their own free will and accord, four of the six hundred who have engaged in the combination, will be at work in their mills again, before the 15th inst.
